




Data Accuracy

As we near the end of the year, here are some key things to remember for Uniform Crime Reporting (UCR).

HB 4879 mandated the submission of NIBRS data monthly. The UCR program's goal is the collection of *timely* and *accurate* crime statistics. 1. <u>Submissions Errors</u>

- a. 3-digit numeric codes, sometimes preceded by a 'T' (e.g., 056, 173, 220, T-221, T-935).
- b. Errors received when uploading or entering incidents are blocked and will not appear in the UCR database.



2. Submission Warnings

- a. 4-digit numeric codes, sometimes preceded by a 'T' (e.g., 1203, 1308, 1407, T-1872).
- b. Warnings indicate data in the incident is uncommon or may be misclassified and will need to be verified.



3. DPS Data Quality Checks

- a. DPS follows up with agencies on data quality issues (i.e., data that varies from your normal reporting trends <u>or</u> scenarios that are very rare; needing to be doublechecked by the reporting agency).
- **b. Ensure accuracy:** If corrections are needed, local agencies should update the incident and then resubmit.

Users can view their Errors and Warnings in the UCR system, under File Imports > View FBI EDS/WDS.
