What is NICS?

- The National Instant Criminal Background Check System (NICS)
- Provides information to federal firearms licensees (FFLs) on whether a prospective purchaser is eligible to receive or possess firearms
- NICS has 3 business days to determine whether a proposed gun transfer is prohibited

What is NICS?

- The FFL may lawfully transfer the firearm if a definitive determination is not made in 3 business days
- It is critical for the clerk to respond to NICS inquiries as soon as possible

How to Report

House Bill 3352

Passed by the Texas Legislature in 2009

Implements requirements of the federal NICS Improvement Amendments Act of 2007

Requires clerks to report NICS cases in which an order was issued on or after September 1, 1989

Bipartisan Safer Communities Act of 2022

Signed into federal law on June 25, 2022

Requires additional steps for a NICS background check on persons under the age of 21 seeking to possess a firearm

The additional check is meant to determine if the person has a possibly disqualifying juvenile record

Why Reporting is Important

Prevent the sale of a firearm to an individual who is ineligible to receive or possess a firearm

Maintain public safety

Reporting Requirements


Older cases must still be entered

Cases with an order issued on or after September 1, 2009 must be entered into NICS not later than 30 days after the date of the court order

Reporting Requirements

If an appellate court reverses an order previously reported, the NICS entry must be cancelled no later than 30 days after receiving the mandate

It is the signed court order or receipt of a mandate from an appellate court reversing the order that trigger the reporting requirement

(Including Minors Involved in a Case of Delinquent Conduct or Conduct Indicating a Need for Supervision (Juvenile Case))

Mental Health Commitments (including Minors Involved in a Case of Delinquent Conduct or Conduct Indicating a Need for Supervision (Juvenile Case))

Incompetent to Stand Trial (only when certified to stand trial as an adult)

Acquitted for reasons of insanity or lack of mental responsibility (only when certified to stand trial as an adult)


Do Not Report

- Do NOT report guardianships of minors
- If the subject of a minor guardianship becomes an adult, the minor guardianship should still not be reported



Do Not Report

- Do not report based on the filing of a medical or psychological examination report presented as evidence
- There must be an order filed by the court

Do Not Report (Continued)


Do not report:

- Guardianships of minors
- Emergency mental health detentions, admissions, or warrants
- Orders of protective custody
- Voluntary commitments
- Commitments for temporary or extended outpatient mental health services
- Applications for court-ordered inpatient mental health services that are forwarded to another county to re-file or to hear your original filing
- Court-ordered inpatient chemical dependency or alcohol services

Canceling a Record

- A NICS case should be cancelled if:
 - 1) The case was entered in NICS in error (for example: guardianship of a minor)
 - Select "No" for the Relief from Disabilities question
 - 2) The individual has had his/her right to obtain or possess a firearm restored through the required court hearing and order
 - Select "Yes" for the Relief from Disabilities question

Cancel Record - CJIS Site



Zero Report

For each month in which there are no reportable cases, the clerk must enter a "zero report" into NICS

 A zero report must be entered for each ORI under which a clerk reports


Entry By ORI Report

Shows all cases entered into the NICS database for a specific ORI


Provides the details of the cases, including name, court date, etc.



ORI Compliance Report

Shows if a mental health case or a zero report was entered for each month

Helps agencies track compliance with NICS reporting

DPS Data Validation

DPS asks the clerk to submit documentation (court orders) validating the NICS entry

What timeline does a clerk have to respond to a NICS inquiry?

FAQ

► Immediately is best, but no later than 24 – 48 hours

Would an Order to issue a warrant to have a person apprehended, detained, and transported to a Mental Health Facility be reported?

- ► No
- As listed under DO NOT REPORT on page 3 of OCA's Texas NICS Mental Health Reporting Manual, you should NOT report emergency mental health detention orders, admissions or warrants, or orders for protective custody

If you have multiple mental health commitment orders in the same case number, do you report each order? How do you enter the case number on subsequent orders?

- ➤ Yes, you need to report each mental health commitment order issued by the court
- ▶ If there are multiple orders filed in the same case, add a suffix to the case number for each subsequent order, i.e., cause number 12345-2, 12345-3, etc.

If a person found incompetent to stand trial is then later found competent, do we remove the entry from NICS?

- ► NO the NICS entry for that person remains in the database
- ➤ To regain his/her rights to obtain or possess a firearm, the person must petition the court that entered the prohibiting order and present evidence during a hearing demonstrating that he/she is no longer a danger to public safety

- The recommended best practice is to segregate the NICS mental health-related records from other case records
- Individuals that were entered into the CJIS/NICS database must go through the **Relief from Disability** process to be removed from the database
- The FBI may contact clerks for additional or clarifying information
